We've celebrated quite a few impressive upgrades, new features and improvements to our community over the past year. To give our residents an idea of all they have to be proud of, we've compiled a partial list of how your HOA dues and our board members' dedication have helped to make our community a wonderful place to live. We're especially grateful to all our board members who have dedicated their time and talents to these accomplishments:

- Purchased new yard sale signs that residents may place at the end of their blocks when hosting sales as part of the overall semi-annual community wide yard sales
- Continued the work of the new Community Events Committee

by planning and hosting four free neighborhood events.

- Repaired the clubhouse refrigerator, which was no longer keeping contents cold, and purchased a new upstairs refrigerator (at a display model discount) and freezer for storage of food and treats served to the residents during community-wide gatherings and events.

PLEASE MEET YOUR

2023 HOA BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Board Members are volunteers from our community. Position titles and job responsibilities are subject to change and do not necessarily reflect all of the duties each officer may perform. The Villages at Godley Station Newsletter is a biannual publication.



SCOTT FAIRCHILD, PRESIDENT

The president shall be the chief officer of the association and shall preside at all meetings of the board of directors and the general membership.

- Appoint, with board approval, the chairperson of any appointive committee, a parliamentarian and the chairperson of the nominating committee.
- Present an annual report of board activities to the membership.
- Serve, ex officio, as member of all committees except the nominating committee.
- Signs legal documents with the Secretary and checks with Treasurer (or in the Treasurer's absence with the VP or Secretary)



ROB COKER, VICE PRESIDENT

The vice president shall, in the absence or disability of the president, perform the duties and exercise the powers of the president.

- · He or she also oversees communications on behalf of the association to the residents
- Is responsible for electronic and social media account management, publication of the newsletter and other mailings
- Handles all presidential duties in the absence of the president



KEN BALDWIN. TREASURER

The treasurer shall be the chief financial officer of the association and is responsible for the collection and disbursement of funds and for the financial records of the association.

- · Signs checks with the president or, in the president's absence, with the secretary or vice president
- · Maintains the HOA budget and works with our accounting partner and bookkeeper to balance all accounts
- Presents a monthly financial report to the board and to the membership at each of the homeowner association general membership meetings
 - Serves as Chairperson of the Finance Committee



JULIA HARTENFELS. SECRETARY

Records and maintains minutes of the board, membership and special meetings.

- Keeps the records of the association, including the minutes of committee meetings, members of the association (excluding financial records)
- Keeps the corporate seal of the association and affixes it on all papers requiring said seal
- Signs legal documents with the President and in the absence of the Treasurer and President, signs checks



CHARLOTTE MOORE, MEMBER AT LARGE 1

Oversees ARC requests, regulating the external design, appearance, use, location, maintenance and improvements for all property in the Villages at Godley Station HOA.



SANDRA BOLLIG. MEMBER AT LARGE 2

Manages the community's Covenants, Bylaws and Rules and Regulations documents and develops and implements a systematic approach to ensure equity with enforcing them



DAVID LOTZ. MEMBER AT LARGE 3

Community liaison and voice for the HOA; attends City Council meetings and reports back to the HOA board and the community. Presents the views of the HOA if the board feels it will impact our neighborhood.

AMY DEAN. COMMUNITY MANAGER

Employed by Sentry Management, with whom the HOA contracts to provide management services, include planning and coordination of association meetings, site visits, enforcement of restrictions, contract supervision, collections and detailed manager's reports.

NOMINATIONS CHAIR – KENNETH HENSLEY

Responsible for conducting meetings of the Nominations Committee, identifying potential candidates for Chair of the Finance Committee along with other Board positions, identify the best candidates, agree on nominees and submit a final list to the Secretary for preparation and publication of a ballot.

TOWN HALL MEETING AND COMMITTEE FAIR OFFER OPPORTUNITIES FOR RESIDENTS TO GET INVOLVED IN COMMUNITY

The Villages at Godley Station is inviting residents to two upcoming events designed to help residents learn more and increase their community involvement. On Saturday, April 22, at 4 p.m, the Homeowners Association Board of Directors will host a town hall meeting at Gateway Church, 1702 Pine Barren Road, in Bloomingdale. At 10 a.m. Saturday, May 6, there will be a committee fair at the clubhouse, where residents will have the opportunity to learn about, make suggestions, and volunteer for various community committees.

TOWN HALL ENCOURAGES COMMUNICATION

All residents of Copper Village and The Arbors are invited to attend. During the meeting, which will adhere to more of an informal format than regular board meetings, homeowners can share information and open dialogue. The information shared and discussed by residents can help the board to gauge any concerns homeowners may have and assist them in making good decisions at regular board meetings. The event aims to help homeowners stay connected to each other, while learning about everyone's thoughts and experiences pertaining to life in our community.

In addition, Pooler City Council Members Karen Williams and Aaron Higgins will be in









attendance to talk with residents about issues facing Pooler, city plans and matters, and answer attendees' questions.

COMMITTEE FAIR DESIGNED TO INCREASE INVOLVEMENT

At the May 6 committee fair, residents can visit the clubhouse to chat with board members about the various community committees that are currently seeking volunteer members.

Attendees can learn more about the four committees that have been established so far:

- Communication, which will focus on improving methods of communicating to and from the homeowners.
- Architectural review, which will focus on reviewing proposed exterior changes residents request to make to their property.
- Covenants/rules & regulations, which will focus on the review of existing

- covenants and rules to improve the understanding and requirements, resulting in revised versions.
- Amenities Open Space, which will focus on lagoons, landscape, common areas, and the dog park
- Amenities Building Improvements, which will focus on programming, maintenance and identifying areas
- Activities and Events, which helps to plan, facilitate and staff community events and happenings

The work and time commitment varies depending on the committee and will be discussed as committees gain members and establish meeting times, plans and set goals.

If a resident is interested in forming a committee that has not already been listed, then he or she is welcome to propose the idea to the board, who will consider the possibility and may add a committee if the need is evident.

TIPS FOR TENDING TO INDIAN HAWTHORN

Many homes in our community are landscaped with Indian Hawthorn shrubs. Several homeowners have reported problems with their Indian Hawthorns failing to sprout new leaves or only growing leaves on one side, making the shrubs appear dead from certain angles. If your Indian Hawthorn isn't full and green, here are some issues may be dealing with, along with possible solutions.

Entomosporium leaf spot is the most

common disease of Indian hawthorn and typically appears after periods of frequent rainfall in the spring and fall. The first symptoms are tiny, round, red spots on young leaves. Slow the spread of disease by watering shrubs with drip irrigation rather than overhead sprinklers. Collect and discard fallen diseased leaves during winter, and then mulch the shrubs. Diseased shrubs may be sprayed with Daconil beginning when new leaves first appear in spring until early June. Spray every ten days during rainy spring weather, or every two weeks during dry spring weather.

A severe aphid infestation may lead to leaf distortion, leaf drop and poor vigor. Aphids

can often be removed simply by spraying the infested areas with a direct stream of water or by releasing predatory insects such as lady beetles at the base of the plant. Help prevent future infestations by avoiding the use of broad-spectrum insecticides in the garden, which kill predatory insects. You may need to clip off heavily infested areas of the shrub.

Age is also something to consider. Indian Hawthorn. The shrub grows at a medium rate, and, under ideal conditions, can be expected to live for approximately 20 years — which is roughly the age of most homes in our community. If your shrubs are dead, it's time to remove and replace them.



DEALING WITH HOUSEHOLD MOLD

A PARTICULAR NUISANCE IN HUMID CLIMATES, MOLD CAN DAMAGE PROPERTY IF NOT CLEANED QUICKLY

It's a problem mankind has battled since the dawn of time — controlling mold. It lurks in the corners and can cause major damage and nasty health issues. As long as moisture and oxygen are present, mold can grow indoors or out on virtually any organic substance, including wood, paper, carpet, insulation and food. When excessive moisture accumulates in buildings or on building materials, mold growth will often occur, especially if the moisture problem remains undiscovered or unaddressed.

It is impossible to eliminate all mold and mold spores in the indoor environment — especially in humid environments like ours in Southeastern Georgia. However, mold growth can be controlled by keeping moisture in check. Moisture control is key — mold cannot grow without it.

Left untreated, mold gradually destroys the material on which it is growing. Because molds produce allergens, irritants and toxins, they have the potential to cause a variety of health problems and can exacerbate existing conditions, such as asthma.

If mold is a problem in your home, clean up the mold and get rid of the excess




It is important to clean mold from surfaces outside and inside your home with detergent and water before the material it is growing on becomes so badly damaged in must be replaced.

water or moisture. If an area becomes water damaged, it is important to dry that space and any damaged items within 24–48 hours to prevent mold growth. Fix leaky plumbing or other sources of water to prevent recurrence. Wash mold off hard surfaces with detergent and water and dry completely. Absorbent materials (such as ceiling tiles and

carpet) that become moldy may have to be replaced.
